That's a long, long time for a Yooper to go without a pasty! For those of you who have never made a pasty before, why not join the pasty crew? The folks who have been doing them since about 1946 would gladly show you how to make them, and they could really use the help! Men, women, old, young, in-between, professional chefs, and rank amateurs who don't know how to boil water-all are welcome! Come on down to the church on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings the second week of every month except December, and you'll find plenty of willing teachers to help you become an experienced pasty maker! What is more, you'll have a lot of fun hanging out with these great and friendly pasty chefs!



Lay Leader Lines June 2021

Q: I heard that some people would like to replace the pasty ovens because the ones we have are old and starting to need repairs, but parts are no longer available. Is that true? Where will we get the money, and how much will it take?

A: We have been talking about looking into replacing the pasty ovens. One of the ovens is no longer working and we have been unable to replace the broken part because the parts are unavailable. We still have seven ovens which are operational and can get by with those. Before we invest in new pasty ovens, we would like to hear from the members of the congregation about what they think. The current ovens are old, and we don't know how much longer they will last. It will cost about \$13,000 to replace them all, and we could use money from the sale of the parsonage to pay for them. Pasties have been made in this church since the 1940's, and this project has become an integral part of the church's ministry in Manistique. We earn a significant amount of money which has helped us sustain ministry and mission programs. We have heard from the community that people very much miss our pasties and are wondering when we will start making them again. On the other hand, the pasty crew is aging, and we don't have many younger replacements available to take up the rolling pins as members of our crew become unable to do the work any more. As a result we don't know how much longer we are likely to continue with the project. We would like input from the congregation before we make a decision on whether or not to buy new ovens. We have also been asked to consider building a new steeple on the base of the old steeple that was removed years ago. We do not know how much this would cost, or whether we could even find someone to do the job at this point, but we would get the information if there is enough interest in doing something like this. Again, we could use the money from the sale of the parsonage for this project. While this issue has not received nearly as much attention as the pasty ovens, we would like your input on it also. If you have any ideas, suggestions, or opinions, please see the pastor, one of the lay leaders, or any member of the Administrative Council and share your thoughts!

Pasty sales are to resume June 9 and 10. Sharon Feichtenbiner has completed the food handling course and continues to be certified. Masks will still be required to be worn by the workers. Potato peelers are needed June 8. See Sharon for more information.

There is still no decision on when the hymn sing program will resume at the Medical Care Facility.
