Lay Leader Lines

October 2021

Q: I'm hearing rumors that some committee is trying to change things in this church! Why? I love this church exactly like it is, and I don't want it to change!

A: Life, the life of anyone and anything, is about change! It is a good thing that you love the church, but are you sure you don't want anything to change? If the church today was exactly as it was when it first started back about 150 years ago, we wouldn't have a church building. We'd be meeting in some other building in town. We wouldn't have our own minister. We'd be served by the minister from Fayette, and he would only get here about every other month because he would be walking from Fayette to each of the 5 or 6 churches he served. My guess is that you're glad things have changed since those days! Perhaps you would prefer that we should have stopped changing around 1945. We still heated the church with coal back then, and we often didn't have enough money to pay the coal bill. That's why we started baking pasties- so we could pay the coal bill. The women made them in the church but baked them in their own homes, some of them using wood-burning ovens. Are you certain the women of the church would enjoy carrying raw pasties to their homes to bake in an oven that someone in the family would have had to chop the wood for? Change is a funny thing. People all prefer what they find comfortable, what life was like in their own personal "good old days." The problem is that what someone of 80 considers the "good old days" when the church was as they wish it still was, will be quite different from what a person of 40 considers ideal, and in turn the 40-year-old will have a very different idea of what church should be than a 20-year-old will. Further, most of us really do want some things to change because our needs change. People who didn't need the lift when it was first installed may have regretted having to modify the kitchen in order to accommodate it. The same people today may need the lift in order to access the sanctuary and the social hall, and may have conveniently forgotten that we had to sacrifice part of the kitchen to have a lift. Things change. Needs change. Things which don't change are typically not alive. If we want this church to be a living, vital part of this community and of our own lives, we will change, and the church will also change. Isn't it better to plan what those changes will be so that we continue to be relevant in the future, rather than stuck (and dying) in the past, and no longer able to meet the needs of that changed world?
