PASTOR'S WORDS

In the past decade or so, I have noticed an increase in the use of misinformation that is being spread about in our society. Without getting political, I think that both sides can agree that even during the past couple of national elections there has been a great deal of misinformation or disinformation that has been purported to be truthful. So, what does the *Bible* say about misinformation? Depending upon your translation, you could translate misinformation as lying to one another or trying to deceive another person, both of which we know are not a part of the Christian life and are only harmful to one another because they do not show our love to one another nor to God.

Matthew 15:18 states, "But the words you speak come from the heart—that's what defiles you." So, if we speak misinformation, those words come from our heart and that shows the condition of our heart. But what if we spread misinformation that we don't know is misinformation? Some people might be quick to label this as gossip and they would be correct. Proverbs 4:23 says, "Guard your heart above all else, for it determines the course of your life." If we allow for this misinformation to enter into hearts, it will guide our lives and actions and mislead us to take false actions.

As the world watches the atrocities being committed in Ukraine at the hands of the Russian soldiers and the catastrophic loss of human life, I can't help but think about how this situation is being represented across the border in Russia under the command of President Putin. This humanitarian crisis unfolding before us is the worst since WWII with the number of people being displaced.

PASTOR'S WORDS


UMCOR is helping with international relief to assist those families needing assistance. You can give through our church and we will for-

A View From the Belfry **April, 2022**

Howdy from the belfry! It must be spring in Manistique. Every possible kind of weather except for nice has hit us recently! Well, that isn't guite true. I've heard that there was a short period of a few days in which the sun shone brightly, the sky was blue, and the temperature hit the 50's, but I was out of town and missed it! Of course that was followed by a major ice storm, snow, heavy rain, and fierce winds, all the same day! Yep, a typical U.P. spring! Of much greater concern to me is a suggestion that maybe I should do something about all that bad weather! Oh, me! I'm at a loss! (I flunked the weather modification course in Bat School.) However, I did do a little research on the subject, in Florida! (Even bats need a vacation now and then, you know!) I have found that in Florida, a temperature in the 50's is considered arctic weather! They also seem to think that a temperature in the 90's is a little warm, instead of appropriate for an oven! It occurred to me that people may have differences of opinion as to what constitutes good or bad weather, which made me wonder how I could possibly arrange good weather when folks don't seem to agree on what is good weather and what isn't. Then I heard about the tornadoes in Texas, and somehow a little ice and snow when it's supposed to be spring doesn't seem so bad, even with the slippery roads and power outages we've had. I think it must be better to lose your electricity for a few hours than to lose your house and everything in it and have to start over. Somehow, from there I jumped to the situation in Ukraine, and the devastation those people are enduring, and it occurred to me that sometimes we all need a reminder that we don't have it too bad in comparison with what some folks are suffering. I decided that I probably can't do too much about the weather, but maybe I can remind everybody that things could be worse—much, much worse—than they are here. Thus, I guess I'll leave the weather up to those weather people who know all about it except how to change it, and I'll concentrate on seeing what I can do to make this batty world a better place to be for those who are in the middle of a war zone through no fault of their own. I might start by sending some surplus food to those who are going hungry in Ukraine. I wonder, though, whether or not Ukrainians eat mosquitoes, and whether or not they would really want a supply of them. I guess I'll have to give that some more thought. Meanwhile, many of you are contributing to UMCOR, which, along with many other humanitarian organizations, is working to assist the besieged people in Ukraine. If you want to contribute, just write out a check to this church and designate it for UMCOR Ukrainian relief. If you make your check out to this church, we will get credit as a church for contributing to a mission project with 100% of your donation going directly to UMCOR Ukraine relief. If you prefer to send it directly to UMCOR yourself, make the check out to Global Ministries/UMCOR with "Advance #982450-Ukraine" written on the memo line and mail it to Global Ministries/UMCOR, GPO, P.O. Lay Leader Lines April, 2022

Q: I am so upset about the terrible situation in the Ukraine that I want to do something about it. I do give money toward helping those suffering people as I can, but I can't give much more than I already do. Is there something else I can do?

A: Right now, as always, there is a need for funds to obtain the necessary food and materials, medical supplies, and the like to assist those who are in dire need of the basic necessities of life. I do not know of any well established ways of actually going to the area and providing hands-on labor. If anyone knows of any means of helping beyond contributing money, please contact Janet Helmbold with the information. There may be ways of donating blankets, clothing, building materials, and other necessities to the area. There may also be ways we can support those who are displaced in other areas such as Poland. If anyone hears of other efforts to support the humanitarian efforts in Ukraine, please share that information with us. My impression is that going over to the area is unlikely to be helpful unless you are connected with an ongoing program which has indicated a need for personnel, and I have not heard of any requests for this type of support. Of course, we can ALL, ALWAYS provide support through our prayers!
