PASTOR'S Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ: WORDS

As Easter is fast approaching, April 9th, I would like us to consider this question: what is Easter's true significance? We, pastors included, can get caught up in the small things as we prepare for the biggest religious observance in our liturgical calendar. I saw a Twitter post recently that read:

"Clergy and Church Workers, here is our yearly reminder: Jesus will rise from the dead even if you forgot to print out the right hymns even if the lilies arrive already wilted... even if the whole choir gets food poisoning. Nothing will keep the stone from rolling away. You are loved." – Nadia Bolz-Weber

If you are like me, you may have just smiled or chuckled to yourself. Also, if you are like me, you may have just realized many truths are said in jest and the above statement gave you pause to ponder: what is Easter's true significance? Among all the preparations, family gatherings, rabbits, and Easter Egg hunts, I ask that we not lose sight of the true meaning of Easter: our Lord's sacrificial love to the point of death upon a cross. Likewise, as his disciples, our Lord said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another," (John 13:34-35). We are to look for ways to demonstrate sacrificial love for one another not just within our local church, but for the entire community at large (city, county, state, country, world). If we are to sacrifice something of ourselves out of love, we must allow the Holy Spirit to guide us toward thinking outside ourselves and the immediate church community. St. Augustine of Hippo, strongly influenced by Plato's Theory of Forms, believed in both an earthly body of Christ and a spiritual one in the heavens where Christ is head of both. St. Augustine believed true reality is invisible (spiritual and of the heav-

enlies) and, if the visible (earthly church) reflects the invisible, it does so only partially and imperfectly. Our earthly manifestations (church buildings,

ceremonies, etc.) are only one of many ways we can live into becoming one with the body of Christ in the heavenlies. When we give of ourselves out of sacrificial love, the church of the heavenlies and the earthly church become more aligned. This makes sense when you look at the world around you. Creation is imperfect. Our earthly Church is imperfect. We, as a people and as individuals, are imperfect. This is okay because God deemed Creation "good" and not "perfect" (Genesis 1). However, we are to strive towards aligning God's ultimate will for Creation with the imperfect one from the fall. God achieved God's ultimate will to redeem Creation through his sacrifice on the cross. We are called to do likewise (Mark 8:34-39). Some of us may look at the world around us, or at our own personal lives' difficulties, as a wilderness. Some of us may feel like we, or our world, are trapped in a never-ending Good Friday. God reminds us through Christ's sacrificial love on the cross that no matter how long we wander in the wilderness, or believe we are entrapped in a never-ending Good Friday, Easter comes in the morning. We are an Easter people. We are a Resurrection people. Whatever we may conceive of as hopelessness, weariness, or despair, God has already answered resoundingly with the Resurrection of our Lord. We can find peace and hope in knowing God has already answered this world's ultimate end (death) by making all things possible through Christ Jesus.

So, Happy Easter (early)!

## United Methodist Women News Submitted by Carol Weinert

The March general meeting of the Manistique United Women in Faith (UMW) opened with devotions given by Lynn LaRose.

The first order of the day was to finalize plans for the annual Reflection Breakfast to be held Saturday, April 1. Due to the fact that the "Virus" is still in the area, it was decided that the event would be open primarily to our church members only.

A discussion took place concerning the group's participation in the Hymn Sing which was held at the Schoolcraft Medical Care Facility monthly until the Covid Pandemic canceled the program. The facility now again welcomes volunteers to present programs of visitations, crafts, games, and Hymn Sings. Perhaps our group can organize such a program for the residents of the facility.

There are now some necessary opening on our UMW board: another member is needed for the nominating committee due to Connie Meade moving out of state; and a new secretary is needed to relieve Louise Burson due to family health reasons.

For years, the UMW in Manistique have been making layettes for babies between birth and 3 months of age. Darlene Pruess recognized that many families have difficulty providing all that is needed for a newborn baby. To assist them in meeting some of the needs, she organized the layette program and inspired many of the women to participate by donating time, money, and labor. Layettes are made for both boys and girls. Each layette gift contains 1 hat, 1 onesie, 1 sleeper, 1 blanket or quilt, and 1 receiving blanket. In addition, a layette may also contain extra items donated by individuals. Some of the basic items are purchased, such as the sleepers and hats, although some extra items were made by the talented women in our UMW. For years Gene Hastings and Norma Johnson made the receiving blankets. Now they are made by several of the UMW members. Norma Johnson made the quilts given to the babies; she made over 60 of them before her passing. The layettes were assembled and delivered to the Schoolcraft County Health Department Office by Helen Hall, until 2008, when she passed away. Since 2009 Lynn LaRose has taken on this responsibility. On one occasion during the COVID crisis, Lynn was in a line of people waiting to enter the Health Department Office, holding the layettes to be delivered. Some of the people in line were curious about the baby items she was holding, so she explained the layette program to them. One of the gentlemen waiting in line stated that he has five children, and that every single one of them received a layette. He added, "God bless the Methodist women!" Many other families also are grateful for this program, and Lynn thanks all of those who have contributed their time and money to this project!

The layette program has been a success in this community. It exists because of the financial support and efforts of the dedicated members of our local UMW chapter, plus the support of the church family. If you would like to contribute to the layette program, we gladly accept financial contributions. Checks can be written to "The United Methodist Women" with "layettes" specified on the check memo line. Cash is also accepted. Please put it in an envelope labeled "UMW layettes." Money can be given to Linda Moon, the UMW treasurer, or placed in the offering plate during the Sunday worship service. The money will be used to purchase items needed for the layettes, including flannel for the receiving blankets as needed. Donations of other items are also welcomed. One yard of flannel will make one receiving blanket and two burp cloths. Donations can be given to Connie Kelsey in the office, or to Lynn LaRose. New and used items are accepted. Used items must be clean and in good condition, and are donated separately from the layette packages.
