

PASTOR'S WORDS

Welcome to the belated edition of our June newsletter. I wanted to wait until after our 2023 Annual Conference was finished so that I could provide the latest updates to everyone rather than having to wait for the Ju-

ly newsletter. This year's AC was a mixed bag of emotions, from the AC approving the disaffiliation of 60 churches that are leaving the Michigan Conference of the UMC to a surprise donation of \$5,000 to the Readers to Leaders program. The usual humorous interludes (often unintentional, fun nonetheless) were also sprinkled throughout the conference with our Bishop David Bard usually being involved, but it was always full of grace.

In ACs of years past there have been moments of challenge caused by remarks during our plenary sessions, particularly over legislative matters relating to human sexuality, etc. This year, I would say we acted more like John Wesley's *The Character of a Methodist*:

"But as to all opinions which do not strike at the root of Christianity, we think and let think. So that whatsoever they are, whether right or wrong, they are no distinguishing marks of a Methodist." (emphasis added)

From my perspective, it looks like the most outspoken voices that have made the challenging remarks in years past have either left the denomination or are no longer speaking out. The overall feeling from those remaining is a message of love and acceptance for all who still call themselves United Methodists. There did appear to be a majority (90%?), judging from how the votes were cast during plenary sessions, that supported the inclusion of all in every aspect of church ministry.

By now, I'm sure lots of questions and what-if scenarios are swirling through your mind, as they are mine. General Conference will meet in 2024 to hear legislation that has been accumulating since the special conference held in 2019, since the

be a backlog of years of legislation. Some churches have chosen disaffiliation over waiting for the next GC to see what options could come next. I personally wonder if those churches were already unhappy

with our denomination and this was an opportunity for them to leave that they were seeking. In that case, I would perceive it as a hasty decision, but I do not know every church's reasons for disaffiliation.

When I look around our local church family here, I do not see us looking for a reason to disaffiliate. I don't want to summarily speak for everyone in our congregation as I know that each of us has a different opinion on where we individually stand, but I call our attention back to John Wesley's words at the beginning of this article.

Our diversity is what makes us great. We are not all the same, just as the 12 disciples that Jesus called were markedly different than each other. Yes, they fought from time to time, but Jesus kept them together and taught them what was important. Jesus also encouraged the conversation, with care, so that everyone could learn.

If there is concern in your heart for our local church and what our future may look like, I would like to know about it. We may even have a church dialogue together so that we can talk about what questions we all have about these concerns. Rest assured, this will not be a voting meeting. Instead, let it be a time filled full of grace where we can practice showing our love for everyone, respecting our differences, and still being the Body of Christ for the world.




A View From the Belfry June, 2023
