PASTOR'S WORDS I have been weighing the following words carefully over the past 2 months. My hope is that they will illuminate and educate and not draw lines to separate. In order for us to have the conversation about where we understand our local

church is in the conversation about human sexuality, we need to educate ourselves so that we speak with wisdom and not pure emotion. So, here is a basic history lesson, a "State of the UMC" if you will, that will get everyone up to speed on how we got here in the first place.

In 1968, the joining of the Methodist Church with the Evangelical United Brethren formed the UMC. During the next general conference in 1972, issues were raised over proposed language naming homosexuals as people of sacred worth. The issue remains unsettled for the past 51+ years. There have been amendments to the language in our social principles, additions to our *Book of Discipline* (the document that guides the polity, structure, and adds to the clarification of the theology of our churches), and much debate and controversy over all issues related to defining human sexuality.

The 2 main issues that have come from the attempts to define human sexuality have been:

- Marriage of same-sex couples
- Ordination of homosexual clergy defined as "self-avowed practicing homosexual" With our society and current culture further defining human sexuality far beyond simply "homosexual" to include non-binary, etc., you can see where this can quickly become a "what about \_\_\_\_\_\_?" debate. The statement of "self-avowed practicing homosexual" was carefully chosen back in 1972 so as not to lead to a witch-hunt style set of accusations that would further cause harm and hatred within the church. No further definition of that statement has come from legislative action of the General Conference of the UMC. This has caused appeals to the UM Judicial Council to be sent back to Annual Conferences with strong warning messages that it can not rule on these types of appeals as the statement is not defined in legislation.

So where is the UMC at with this issue today? In our *Book of Discipline* and the accompanying *Book of Resolutions*, the UMC affirms:

"...that sexuality is God's good gift to all persons. We call everyone to responsible stewardship of this sacred gift."..."Although all persons are sexual beings whether or not they are married, sexual relations are affirmed only with the covenant of monogamous, heterosexual marriage." The church states elsewhere that marriage should only be between a woman and a man. The

church deplores all forms of commercialization, abuse and exploitation related to sex and calls for strict global enforcement of laws prohibiting the exploitation of children.

"We affirm that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God," and that all persons need the ministry of the church.

"The UMC does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching. We affirm that God's grace is available to all. We will seek to live together in Christian community, welcoming, forgiving and loving one another, as Christ has loved and accepted us. We implore families and churches not to reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends. We commit ourselves to be in ministry for and with all persons."

"The United Methodist Church is a part of the church universal, which is one Body in Christ." The United Methodist Church acknowledges that all persons are of sacred worth. All persons without regard to race, color, national origin, status or economic condition shall be eligible to attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments, upon baptism be admitted as baptized members, and upon taking vows declaring the Christian faith, become professing members in any local church in the connection."

Many churches with strong conservative political views have chosen to disaffiliate from the denomination over fears of the statements above. Some churches with opposing (liberal) political views have also chosen to disaffiliate from the denomination over the hatred directed towards people that are a part of their local churches. Other churches have remained UMC as we have while they wait to see what the next General Conference in 2024 will reveal for the path forward.

During the past several Annual Conferences (Michigan), Bishop David Bard has encouraged local churches to allow space for everyone within the church. There has not been any heavy-handed legislation nor any stubborn leadership style portrayed from our conference's leadership as we have been navigating these issues over the years. There has been patience, so I would encourage us to take our time when discerning our options that may come from the 2024 General Conference.





#### **Lay Leader Lines** November, 2023

Q: I hear that some people in this church want to remodel the sanctuary and eliminate the altar area. They also want to rebuild the steeple to look like it did years ago, with a point on top. Is this true? I love this church just the way it is! Why would we change it?

A: One of the functions of the governing bodies of the church is to engage in long-term planning so that we can continue to meet the needs of the congregation and the community in which the church is located. As society changes, the church needs to remain able to meet these changing needs. This requires planning for the years ahead. As a result there have been discussions about ways in which the sanctuary could be modified to better equip us to meet such needs. One suggestion has been to remodel the sanctuary to reduce the number of different levels in it. At present it has three levels, the main floor and the two levels found in the altar and choir loft area. The current choir loft area is not easily accessible to those with mobility problems, and was designed for a time in which we had a choir which used the choir loft every Sunday. As has happened in many churches over the years, the choir no long exists, and the choir loft is unused except on rare occasions. In fact, it is used more for storage than for anything else. As for the steeple, for years we have had a very small fund set aside to replace the top of the steeple which was removed years ago, but there was little interest in doing so. At present there is somewhat more interest in exploring this possibility. We have also discussed many other ideas to improve the church, such as trying to find a better solution to our parking space limitations than we currently have, which relies on the generosity of the credit union which allows us to use their empty space for parking during the months when it is not needed for holding the snow plowed from their paved parking lot. At this time, we have no firm plans to undertake any of the modifications under discussion. At some point, however, we may want to address how to make this church facility more usable as times and needs change. This is the goal of long-range planning. We have no interest in changing what works well and is useful. Rather, the goal of long-range planning is to insure that the church will continue to be useful and adequate to meet the needs of the congregation and the community into the future.
