

# A View From the Belfry December, 2023

Happy Holidays from Benny and all his batty relatives! By now you have already had your Thanksgiving feast and are looking toward Christmas!

Early in the month we had a church conference by ZOOM, followed by a meeting in person with the District Superintendent, Scott Harmon, in Escanaba. Also in November, you supported the community Thanksgiving dinner at the Big Boy by contributing \$700 toward providing free buffet dinners for their customers (up from \$500 last year). Bette Jahn shopped until she dropped getting supplies for filling Thanksgiving baskets for four families in this community (up from 2 last year). Bette and Mary Whinnen packed 30 shoe boxes to be sent to children around the world who would not receive anything for Christmas otherwise. (That's up from 25 boxes in past years.) The church is being decorated for an open house in early December so those who wish can come in, see the pretty Christmas decorations, and have a few quiet minutes to contemplate, rest, and simply let the Christmas spirit envelop them. The women (don't those ladies ever rest??) are also going to have their Christmas tea, and a modified cookie exchange for those who want to participate. Not to be outdone, the men in the church have been working to finish ongoing projects such as putting the last touches on the back stairwell to the Pastor's office. Not only that, Gordon Barry graciously provided pulpit supply for Pastor B.J. on a Sunday morning so he could get out in the woods and terrorize all those hapless deer out there. I'm really glad I'm a bat and not a deer about this time of year!

As a very modest and rather shy little bat, I'm a bit embarrassed to share this last little bit with you, but...aw, gee! I was tickled pink, and I really do want you all to know. Back when the church had its trunk or treat event, I noticed that many of the trunks were very nicely decorated for Halloween.
