PASTOR'S WORDS If I tell my children about some story that happened in my past, how do they know if it's true if they weren't there to see it happen? There must be a level of trust on their part that what I tell them is true, because I cannot always prove to them that these things really happened. What if I tell them

that I will love them forever and always be there for them? Again, they can only believe me if they trust me.

The Bible is filled with stories of events that happened in the past that none of us were able to witness firsthand. How do we know these stories are true? What proof do we have that they really happened? The Bible says God created the world in seven days. Where's the proof of that timeline? The Bible says Noah built an ark that saved the animals of the earth from a worldwide flood – where's the proof? The Bible says that God separated the waters of the Red Sea and allowed the Israelites to cross on dry land to escape Pharaoh's army – where's the proof? And what about the resurrection of Jesus Christ – where's the proof?

Prior to the 18th Century, people tended to accept what the Bible said without question. But then came the age of enlightenment, an era in which reason was the primary source of authority. If something made sense, or could be proven scientifically, then it must be true. It was the end of blind belief and adherence without question to the Biblical teachings. Following the age of enlightenment, the world entered what is called the post-modern age: a time when people view the world not so much in terms of black and white; an era in which truth is not easily defined and people are more willing to question what they are told.

These changing views of truth had an impact on how people viewed Scripture. Originally, God's Truth was accepted. In the age of Enlightenment, truth could be accepted if it was proven, and due to a lack of proof, some people began to question the Bible. In the post-modern age, people began to ask, "But even if you can prove it, how do we know that the Bible's Truth is the *right* truth?

Though we live in a postmodern world, one that doesn't necessarily rely solely on scientific evidence, we still want proof. Think of all the shows on television about the

PASTOR'S WORDS search for Noah's Ark – if they could just prove it, then we'd know the story is true, and it would give the Bible more validity, right? If we have proof, then we don't have to decide whether to believe or not – the facts

make the decision for us. We don't risk anything by believing if we have proof.

We don't like risks. We want guarantees. We want evidence so that we can see the end results before beginning something new and unfamiliar. We need to know how things are and how they'll turn out for us before we make any kind of commitment. We want things explained to us so we can understand. Knowledge and understanding give us control and power — without a sense that we are in charge, we have to put our trust somewhere other than in ourselves. And we don't like that, because as long as we're in control, we can choose to change course or bail out altogether. We'd rather put our trust in self than anywhere else.

Faith is defined as confidence or trust in another person or thing, or belief that is not based upon proof. Hebrews Chapter 11 presents Abraham as an illustration of how faith doesn't require proof, but it does involve belief and trust.

As we enter into our season of Advent, let us remember where and who we place our faith and trust in.

We have received several questions regarding the special Administrative Council Meeting scheduled for December 3, 2024 at 11 am. Pastor B.J. has been in contact with our District Superintendent Scott Harmon regarding his recommendations on how to proceed. He also participated in an in-person session with Bishop David Bard in Marquette, and will relay that information to us.

Our goal for this church is to discuss the issue more fully. We know that there are many differences of opinion among us, yet so far we have been able to treat each other kindly and with respect and Christian love. We seek to maintain this atmosphere during the upcoming meeting and afterwards. We are at a point where, if we make a decision to take any specific stand, or if we decide not to do so, we will encounter opposition and dissatisfaction on the part of some members of this church. We would like to have a meaningful, respectful discussion in which we can agree to disagree without getting into an "us vs them" mentality. Can we get along with each other in a warm, welcoming church as we have done and at present we are continuing to do, or will we let this one contentious issue divide us into warring factions? Please give your response to this question careful consideration. Whether or not we make a final decision or decide not to do so at this time, let us maintain the caring and accepting demeanor for which this church is known. Remember this phrase from an old hymn: "They will know we are Christians by our love."




