
out with any questions you may have. Our goal is to ensure that everyone feels informed and supported as we move forward together.

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

A NOTE FROM THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL:

The Administrative Council met on September 12, 2025. We reviewed and accepted the minutes from the June meeting, as well as the reports from the Financial Secretary and Treasurer. We are doing well financially. Although in a few areas we have spent more than the budgeted amounts, overall we are significantly under budget and will have ample funds to cover all anticipated costs for the remainder of the year. Where expenditures exceeded the budget, the reason was generally that the prices were significantly higher than expected based on prices in previous years. Committee reports were presented and accepted.

In old business, the SAS (Simplified Accountability Structure) program was discussed. It was determined that we are not yet ready to present and make a recommendation regarding the acceptance or rejection of this plan to the upcoming Charge Conference this fall. If we do decide to vote on adopting the program we will call for a special Charge Conference to address the issue.

In June it was noted that we need to find replacements for the back-up Financial Secretary and Treasurer. We currently have both positions filled, but both have asked to be relieved of their appointments. We are continuing to look for replacements.

In other old business, the audit is still ongoing. We are making progress, but it is going slowly. Part of the problem is that we have not had an audit for several years because we were unable to find anyone to do the auditing for the church. We hope to complete the audit during the coming year.

In new business, we added a policy to have a motion to pay all due bills to the agenda at each council meeting. This was recommended by the auditor, and inadvertently dropped a few years ago. It was moved and approved to add this item to the meeting agenda, beginning with this September meeting. At this meeting, it was moved and approved to pay all due bills.

In other new business, it was moved and accepted to place the Staff-Parish Relations Committee report last on the agenda of each Ad. Council meeting, since this is the only committee which may need to go into closed session to discuss confidential matters. By reporting last, others present can be excused from the meeting without having to call them back after the confidential session is over. This motion was approved.


The Administrative Council will meet in conjunction with the annual Church Conference on November 2 at 2 PM. The next regular meeting will be held on January 13 at 10 AM.
